Students and staff of Westernport Elementary showed courage and resilience during the unexpected May 13, 2025 storm that caused the parking lot and first floor of the school to flood and forced

those who were in the building to be moved to the second floor and then be evacuated by boats to the former Lutheran Church on Westernport Hill. Students and staff who could not return from a field trip but who were diverted Mountain Ridge High School showed courage and resilience as they spent seven or more hours waiting for family members to pick them up. Students and staff who lost personal possessions in the flood showed courage and resilience as they picked up the pieces of their lives in the aftermath of the event which brought much uncertainty to all.

After things settled down, students and staff were off to Frostburg State University (Great idea, Ms. Ellie Bolton!) at the invitation of the Children's Literature Centre which was gladly endorsed by the university administration. Students were welcomed by FSU staff and mascot, Bob E. Bobcat, as they arrived by school bus. The students recited the pledge of allegiance before entering the Education and Health Sciences Center to go to what would be their classrooms for their 7-day sojourn at FSU. Activities for the week (Day 1) included a presentation by Rick Rando from Kick Masters, mindfulness lessons led by CLC staff and school guidance counselors, and a play based on the Elephant and Piggie books; (Day 2) consisted of CLC children's literature activities and time spent in classrooms; (Day 3) included a school-wide trip to the Cumberland YMCA; (Day 4) featured CLC Storytime followed by the traditional Fifth Grade Farewell, Ms. Katie's Karaoke, then a walk to Beall Elementary to view a BMX Performance; On (Day 5) students viewed third, fourth and fifth grade projects displayed at the AEP Showcase; clapped for recent graduates/WES Alumni who returned in caps and gowns to make the Annual Senior Walk and competed in CLC mini-Pirates Ahoy event in the FSU gym; On (Day 5) there was a group picture with students in "Future Bobcat" t-shirts followed by the annual WES Field Day, a Mountain City Center for the Arts presentation and Father's Day craft. Finally, (Day 7) held the annual Tie Dye craft, Dunk Tank splash and a community-led event "The Magic of Libraries" event, which featured

Mr. Toad's Pottery.

We wish to thank all who helped during the whirlwind of well done art, music, physical education activities, project displays, and social-emotional activities as well as those who made great effort to make sure that the traditional year-end activities were able to go on. It was a true blessing to be able to finish the school year at Frostburg State University with our school community spirit intact.

Author Caron Levis visited Westernport Elementary on April 25, 2025. She told students about how she writes her books and how she got the idea for her first book when she was 22 years old. 25 years later, Ms. Levis has written many, many books. She told the students that she takes an idea from real life and just adds her imagination!

Ms. Levis has wanted to be a writer since she was in elementary school because she was reader and reading a book was like going on an adventure. She loved the *Ramona* books, by Beverly Cleary. She also enjoyed books that made her feel like there was someone else who understood her life. So she started writing seriously in middle school and later went to college to learn more.

Ms. Levis's most popular book is called <u>Ida</u>, <u>Always</u>, and it was the first book that she wrote. Two other titles that she mentioned were also inspired by nature; <u>Feathers Together</u> and <u>Mighty</u>, <u>Mud-dy Us</u></u>. Sometimes Ms. Levis travels from New York City to distant countries to see the animals that she wants to write about. That, she said, is another fun part of her life as an author.

The Stock Market Game

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The winners of the **Citizenship Award** were Porter Beard and Eligah Keaton.





Drew Daywalt Visits WES



On April 23, 2025, author Drew Daywalt spoke to WES students about the process of being an author. He also read his book <u>Little Freddie Two Pants</u> to the entire school. Students enjoyed this very funny book!!

Mr. Daywalt wanted to write books since he was seven years old, but instead he wrote for movies, for TV shows and for Disney cartoons until he was 33 years old. Then Mr. Daywalt published his first book, <u>The Day the Crayons Quit</u> when he was 34 years old. He got the idea from a box of crayons that was sitting on his desk!

Mr. Daywalt now works from home, which is his favorite part about being an author. He has written 30 books, but he told students it is definitely not easy. A book takes one to two years to finish. First he needs a good idea, then he writes the words and sends them to New York City with the hope that a publisher will buy the book. Finally the words move on to an editor and then onto an illustrator, which might take another six months or more. So an author needs to have patience.

Mr. Daywalt visited classrooms throughout the building and had lunch with several students. He also signed his name in books as he went from classroom to classroom. Students in Kindergarten and first grade received a copy of <u>The Day the Crayons Quit</u>. Students in grades two and three received a copy of <u>Rock, Paper, Scissors</u>. Students in grades four and five received a copy of <u>No, Sam</u>, which is Mr. Daywalt's latest book. Mr. Daywalt lives in California with his wife and dogs so it was a long trip to come to see students at Westernport Elementary. But we are glad that he did!
