Student Book Reviews

Students in grades 4 and 5 had an assignment to write book reviews to include in Follett Destiny, the school library online circulation program. The students logged into Destiny Discover, clicked on "My Stuff" and then chose a book that they had previously checked out. Then the students wrote a brief review of the book. Although only a 1-5 Star rating and two sentences were required for the students to give their opinion and/or recommendation, some students took the time to write even more.

Demmie Alt reviewed the story, <u>Pete the Cat and the Bad Banana</u>, by James Dean. Demmie wrote: "I like this book because I like bananas (and it is a really good book.)" **Jace Lytle** reviewed the book, <u>The Sea of Monsters</u>, by Rick Riordan. Jace wrote: "This is one of my top seven favorite books of all time. I EXTREMELY recommend this book for kids my age or for younger readers to read with an adult.. It is slightly different from the movie and show, but still over all amazing! For example, there is the part when Tyson is literally blown up with heat equal to a couple thousand degrees and is supposedly gone for good but shows up FIREPROOF with the golden fleece in his hand. He made it out unscathed. This adventure is golden, perfect and so beautifully made. I've read this book a gazillion times over; and would love everyone else to read it, too. I'd give anything to read it again for the first time ever!" **Carter Blacka** used his book review skills from the previous year and his review popped up on the circulation program dashboard for approval before the assignment was even given! He wrote about <u>Dog Man: The Scarlet Shedder</u> and said that it was a very good book and that he highly recommended it.

Please have your children in the appropriate child restraint when bringing your children to school in your vehicle for any reason. Maryland's Child Passenger Safety Law requires that children under eight years old or 80 pounds in weight are to be in a child restraint unless the child is 4'9" or taller. Every child from 8 to 16 years old who is not secured in a child restraint must be secured in the vehicle's seat belt, in every sitting position in the vehicle. The fine for not having a child secured is \$83.00, which includes court costs.

Children's Author, Beth Ferry, Visits WES



On December 6, 2024, author Beth Ferry visited WES as part of the school's partnership with the Children's Literature Centre at FSU. Ms. Ferry dreamed of being a children's author when she was a stay at home mom. Now she has written over 40 books!

Ms. Ferry talked to students in grades K-5 about how she gets ideas for writing her books. She told students that 10% of writing a book is by using her imagination to come up with an idea, 20% is writing the first (often messy) draft of the story and then 70% of the process is to revise the story over (and over and over...) She also told students that it takes several years, at times, to make the words in her books satisfy her. (Sometimes when she gets stuck, she rereads her favorite childhood books, such as <u>Harry, the Dirty Dog</u>, for inspiration!)

When Ms. Ferry finishes the words for her book, someone else picks the illustrator, who can be from anywhere in the world. Ms. Ferry and the illustrator talk via Zoom to put the words and illustrations together.

At the end of her presentation Ms. Ferry read her book, <u>The Christmassy Cactus</u> to the students. (She told them that this particular book took her 163 revisions over a period of more than two years!) Ms. Ferry always hopes that her books bring smiles to children's faces. Her books definitely do!

October and November guidance and social skills lessons focused on bullying prevention and recognizing the signs of bullying. To further help our school be a safe and respectful place, we utilize the Second Step Bullying Prevention Unit. In this unit, your child learns specific skills to help stop bullying. Students learned how to:

- •Recognize when bullying is happening, report bullying to a caring adult, and how to refuse to let bullying happen;
- •Be a bystander who helps stop bullying (another term is "upstander...);
- •Support someone being bullied by standing up for that person and being kind and inclusive; and
- Recognize, report, and refuse cyber bullying when they see or know about it happening.

Get involved in making our school a safe and respectful place by letting us know if you hear about bullying at our school. Make sure your child knows to tell you or someone at school if he or she is being bullied, or if he or she knows about someone else being bullied. For more information on our school's anti-bullying policy and specific procedures, check our school website or contact the school office. Thank you for helping us make our school a safe, respectful place where everyone can learn!

This is a wonderful opportunity for students to work collaboratively with others on subjects such as social skills, self control, and anxiety. Small group instruction takes place during extra library media/social skills classes or during students' lunch times. During the month of December, students will learn the character trait of the month, "Integrity", and continue to practice and review their TOOLBOX tools - ask your student to teach you about the breathing tool!
