Fire Prevention=Every Week

No one wants to hear the sound of sirens as fire trucks scream through the streets. But fires are a reality. Fire Prevention Week is October 6-12, 2024 and The National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) always uses this as an opportunity to educate students and parents about fire safety. This year's theme is "Smoke Alarms: Make them work for you!" The NFPA website reminds us to Install smoke alarms in every bedroom, outside each separate sleeping area (like a hallway), and on each level (including the basement) of the home. Test smoke alarms at least once a month by pushing the test button. Replace all smoke alarms when they are 10 years old or stop responding when tested.

Once a fire starts in your home, you may have as little as two minutes to escape. Advance planning and a practiced fire escape route can save lives. NFPA suggests the following when making an escape plan for your family:

- Look for places that a fire may start
- Listen for the sound of the smoke alarm
- Learn two ways out of each room

NFPA, which has sponsored Fire Prevention Week since 1922, also stresses general fire prevention and lists a series of checks to be made in the home to lessen the chances for a fire. Schoolwide Title I-What's That?



Westernport Elementary School is one of nine schools in Allegany County which have been identified to receive Title I funds and to operate a schoolwide Title I program.

<u>Criteria</u>

- At least 40% of the student population is eligible for Free and Reduced Meals (FARMS)
- Title I funds are used to upgrade the educational program so that the education for ALL children is improved
- All children are eligible for Title I services

Program Components

 Comprehensive needs assessment of the entire school which focuses on the achievement of students on the state academic content and achievement standards

- Schoolwide reform strategies that are evidence based and are designed to address the needs of all students and especially the low achieving students
- Strategies to increase parent/family/stakeholder engagement
- Plans to assist preschool children in their transition from early childhood programs to elementary school
- Coordination and integration of federal, state, and local services and programs including violence prevention, nutrition, housing, Head Start, adult education, vocational and technical education, and job

Each Title I school develops a schoolwide plan which includes all of the school wide Title I components and which may be reviewed on each school's website. Title I plans are available in each school office for parent/community review and comment. Annually, principals review the Title I schoolwide program with parents.

SECURE! Get inside. Lock outside doors.

STUDENTS

Return to inside of building Do business as usual

ADULTS

Bring everyone indoors Lock outside doors Increase situational awareness Account for students and adults Do business as usual



LOCKDOWN! Locks, lights, out of sight.

STUDENTS

Move away from sight Maintain silence Do not open the door

ADULTS

Recover students from hallway if possible Lock the classroom door Turn out the lights Move away from sight Maintain silence Do not open the door Prepare to evade or defend



EVACUATE! (A location may be specified)

STUDENTS

Leave stuff behind if required to if possible, bring your phone Follow instructions

ADULTS

Lead students to Evacuation location Account for students and adults Notify if missing, extra or injured students or adults



SHELTER! Hazard and safety strategy.

STUDENTS


Use appropriate safety strategy for the hazard

Student learning is also enriched by experiences in Art, Band/Orchestra, Library Media, Music, and Physical Education during time with resource teachers.



Hayley and John Rocco, Author & Illustrator, Visit WES



Author Hayley Rocco and illustrator, John Rocco, visited Westernport Elementary School on Friday, October 4, 2024 to talk to students in grades K-3 about their first book together, which is called <u>How to Send a Hug!</u> This presentation was brought to WES due to a two-year partnership between Westernport Elementary and the Frostburg State University Children's Literature Centre. Ms. Rocco told students that she got the idea of writing the book after thinking about the many letters that she had written to and received from her grandparents when she was a child. She and Mr. Rocco used slides as they read the book to the students and then explained about the parts of a letter, as well as how to address an envelope and where to place a stamp. Ms. Rocco told students that sending a hug by writing a



letter is something that the person who received the "hug" will always treasure.

The couple had time at the end of their presentation to show students a new book that they are working on now. It will be called <u>Hello, I'm a Pangolin</u>. The book, part of a new series about unusual animals, tells about the pangolin, an animal that Ms. Rocco actually held in her arms while visiting sub-Saharan Africa, where these so-called "scaly anteaters" live. They also answered questions from students.

Ms. Rocco was in Frostburg to receive the 2024 CLC Children's Book Award from Frostburg State University Children's Literature Centre. This annual award is given to the author of a children's picture book which most embodies the attributes of compassion, love, or courage. The aim of the CLC is to encourage and support an author/illustrator in the early years of their career, and one who has published in the United States within the past three years.

i-Ready, Set, Goal!



i-Ready is an online math curriculum that provides students of all ages with differentiated instruction and supports them on their individual paths to success.

Fourth and fifth grade classes each passed over 400 i-Ready lessons (as of October 4th) and have earned a prize from the Math/Tech team. Prizes were presented by Mrs. Kate Pratt, ACPS math specialist.

Representing grade 5, Aveona Durst punched through the cover of the 400 level cup to reveal a prize that will be enjoyed by all fifth grade students. Aveona has personally passed 53 lessons so far.



Fire Prevention Week: Local Firefighters Visit WES



Members of Potomac Fire Company No. 2 spent the day at Westernport Elementary School on Wednesday, October 9, 2024 and talked with students about fire prevention. Deputy Chief Bill Kight and fire company members Schelotta Kight, Michelle Kight, Shane Fazenbaker and Jennifer Sears (all former WES students) as well as Shane Elliott (a WES Parent) provided a variety of activities for each grade level of students.

Deputy Chief Kight explained that Kindergarten visits to the fire station began after a home fire in 1977 tragically took the lives of three WES students. Mrs. Judy Fogle, Kindergarten teacher, felt that students needed to know more about fire prevention and arranged for her class to visit the fire station. An October visit by Kindergarten has continued ever since. Fire prevention programs at the school were later added and now are yearly events. In fact, Mr. Kight told his audience that a WES student who was in the audience during a fire prevention presentation was able to rescue his brother in 2005 when their house caught fire and no lives were lost.

Students were quizzed on various fire safety measures and did a great job answering the questions. They knew how important it is to

have an outdoor family meeting place, to plan to have two ways out of a room, when to call 911 and how to "stop, drop and roll" if their clothing catches fire. The firefighters also presented videos about fire trucks and interesting firefighter facts. An interview with Lauren Tarshis, author of <u>I Survived the Great Chicago Fire</u>, 1871 was enjoyed by fourth grade students. Students went outside to see a fire truck and received prizes, as well as an invitation to come to the fire station Open House on Sunday, October 13th.
